#### THE DANIELS DECADE

When Mitch Daniels answered the call to become Purdue University's 12th president in 2012, he embraced the institution's history with optimism for its untapped potential. "I will come to this assignment filled with appreciation for the Purdue we know and excitement for the still greater Purdue that can be," he said. "Helping this great institution achieve even higher levels of research and intellectual excellence by recruiting the finest minds and students anywhere in the world—and delivering to those students an exceptional, affordable education—is the highest calling to which anyone who loves this state as I do could aspire."

Here, we take a look back at the levels of excellence Purdue has reached during Daniels's presidency.

#### STUDENTS

Purdue has increased access to higher education and set a new standard through teaching methods and campus experiences proven to prepare students for successful careers and fulfilling lives.

#### Affordable, Accessible Education

Upon arriving at Purdue in January 2013 following two terms as Indiana's governor, Daniels made affordability and accessibility an administrative priority. Under his leadership, the university froze tuition 11 consecutive years, saving students and their families over \$1 billion.

The cost to attend Purdue today is less than it was a decade ago, and a majority of students now graduate debt free.

New university initiatives—including Purdue Global, Purdue Polytechnic High Schools, and Degree in 3 have increased access to a Purdue education for students of diverse backgrounds. Private gifts for scholarships, fellowships, and programming have also made an impact.

In 2012–13, Purdue raised \$32 million for student support. In 2021–22, it raised \$150 million.

#### **Enrollment and Faculty Growth**

Discussing student enrollment in 2015, Daniels said, "We shouldn't seek to be known by how many we turn down but by how many we turn out." Guided by this vision, Purdue has experienced record enrollments over the past eight academic years.

An all-time high 50,884 students began fall classes in 2022, including a record 37,949 undergraduates.

To accommodate these gains, Purdue has expanded its faculty annually, welcoming a record 213 new faculty in the fall of 2022. Faculty retention has also increased during Daniels's presidency. The four-year retention rate for new professors hired in 2012 was 79.1%; for those joining Purdue in 2017, the four-year retention rate was 95.3%.

#### **CAMPUS EVOLUTION**

In the last decade, Purdue has focused investments on teaching, research, and collaborative spaces; prioritized strategic renovations; enhanced open space connectivity and campus circulation; and strengthened the campus identity and gateways.

#### **New Facilities and Enhancements**

As enrollment continued to grow, the West Lafayette campus underwent several high-profile building projects with 11 new or expanded facilities during Daniels's presidency.

Recent construction includes the Gateway Complex: Dudley and Lambertus Halls; Chaney-Hale Hall of Science; the Agricultural and Biological Engineering Building; the David and Bonnie Brunner Purdue Veterinary Medical Hospital Complex; and Hagle Hall, a new home for Purdue Bands & Orchestras.

Daniels championed the growth of the Discovery Park District at Purdue, a \$1 billion mixed-use development embedded into the fabric of campus. The district's growth helped West Lafayette receive the No. 1 ranking in SmartAsset's list of the best places for career opportunities.

Beyond facilities, a \$1 million renovation of Third Street created a safer pedestrian-friendly corridor between the campus's student residences and north academic areas.

Students, faculty, and staff can now use Third Street's bicycle paths and walkways, which are adorned with colorful surface designs representing iconic campus symbols.

#### A DECADE OF HIGH-IMPACT INITIATIVES

#### **Purdue Global**

In 2018, the university unveiled its online public university geared toward working adults: Purdue Global. Made possible through the acquisition of Kaplan University, the enterprise tailors education to the needs of adults who have work or life experience beyond the classroom.

With 175 programs of study, Purdue Global gives students flexibility to complete classes on their schedules. Of the 32,500 students currently enrolled, 58% are over the age of 30.

#### A New Era for IUPUI

Purdue and Indiana University took initial steps in 2022 to transform IUPUI—a joint venture in Indianapolis between the two entities—into separate academic organizations with their own governance. This <u>new arrangement</u> will expand research activity and enhance funding opportunities for research partnerships, including the creation of a joint biosciences engineering institute.

#### **Purdue Polytechnic High Schools**

Daniels announced plans for a network of tuition-free <u>Purdue Polytechnic High Schools</u> (PPHS) in 2016. This joint venture between the university and Indianapolis Public Schools serves low-income students and students of color, preparing them for future success through STEM-focused project-based learning. The schools also provide a pipeline of qualified undergraduates to Purdue.

The initial PPHS location opened in 2017 and celebrated its first graduating class in 2021. Two Indianapolis locations and a third site in South Bend currently serve more than 1,000 students; a fourth location is in development.

#### **Purdue Moves and Next Moves**

The university advanced the ambitious Purdue Moves agenda in 2013. Designed to place Purdue among the world's top research and teaching institutions, the strategic plan complemented Daniels's commitment to "deliver higher education at the highest proven value."

Purdue Moves included five pillars: Affordability and Accessibility; World-Changing Research; STEM Leadership; Transformative Education; and Online Education.

Launched in 2021, Purdue's Next Moves initiatives are helping to strengthen the university's competitive advantage through five new pillars: Plant Sciences 2.0; National Security and Technology; Purdue Applied Research Institute (PARI); Transformative Education 2.0; and Equity Task Force.

#### Degree in 3

As part of Purdue Moves: Transformative Education, Degree in 3 allows students to complete an undergraduate degree in three years. Those pursuing this option can then enter the workforce or graduate school a year earlier than they would through a traditional plan of study. Degree in 3 also provides a potential tuition savings of \$19,000 or more.

Purdue offers three-year degrees for more than 50 majors across its 11 colleges, including all majors within the College of Liberal Arts.

"If the Purdue of 10 or 20 years from now still enjoys its current vitality, momentum, and reputation, it will be because, in traditional Boilermaker fashion, it has continued the commitment to innovation and change."

#### **Record Fundraising**

Building on the success of <u>Ever True: The Campaign for Purdue University</u>—a historic undertaking that concluded in 2019, bringing in more than \$2.5 billion in philanthropic support over seven years—the <u>Purdue for Life Foundation</u> is setting new fundraising records across the board, including \$542.1 million raised in the most recent fiscal year.

Purdue for Life, created in 2020 by uniting the Purdue Alumni Association and the University Development Office, helps people who love Purdue stay connected, get involved, and give back. One organization now drives and coordinates all alumni-related activities.

The first Purdue Day of Giving, a 24-hour online event, took place in 2014 and raised \$7.5 million from 6,500 donations. The most recent Purdue Day of Giving in 2022 set new records for total dollars raised (\$68.2 million) and total number of gifts (26,726).

#### 150th Anniversary

Purdue celebrated 150 years of giant leaps during a yearlong sesquicentennial celebration launched during Homecoming in 2018.

The anniversary's Ideas Festival connected world-renowned speakers and Purdue experts in conversations about critical problems and opportunities facing the world. More than 45,000 people attended over 60 related events with an additional 475,000 watching online. Guest speakers included Gene Kranz, Apollo 11 flight director; Condoleezza Rice, former U.S. secretary of state; and Beth Ford, president and CEO of Land O'Lakes.

Festivities concluded during Homecoming in 2019 with an astronaut reunion attended by 13 alumni who have traveled to outer space.

#### **Protect Purdue**

In 2020, Purdue became one of the first universities to commit to reopening during the COVID-19 pandemic. The university's leadership felt it was important to have as many students safely on campus as possible to deliver the full Purdue educational experience. The Protect Purdue Plan outlined protocols to ensure the campus community's health and safety, including testing, vaccinations, and contact tracing.

"With over 88% of both students and the overall campus community vaccinated against COVID-19, we were one of the safest places anywhere," Daniels said. By successfully navigating the challenges presented by the highly transmissible virus, Purdue returned to pre-pandemic operations in the fall of 2021.

#### **Business School**

In 2022, Purdue announced its next big move: a transformation of the School of Management into a new School of Business that will prepare students to lead in a technology-driven world. Grounded in the hallmarks of a Purdue education, including STEM disciplines and business analytics, the School of Business will be uniquely positioned to bring discoveries to the marketplace, scale up innovations, and effect societal change.

The first phase of enhancements, set for the fall of 2023, include enrollment growth, targeted faculty expansion, and curricular and experiential additions.

#### **Mitch Daniels Boulevard**

To honor Daniels's decade of leadership, the city of West Lafayette and Purdue University trustees agreed to rename a portion of State Street as Mitch Daniels Boulevard. The naming was announced publicly on December 2 as the university community began <u>MitchFest</u>—a series of celebratory and stimulating public events in recognition of Daniels.

Mitch Daniels Boulevard will run from Grant Street west through Purdue's West Lafayette campus, culminating at U.S. 231. Signage will be installed in the spring 2023 semester.

"Ten's a nice round number. I always say better a year too soon than a day too late." —Mitch Daniels Daniels's tenure leading Purdue comes to a close on December 31, 2022. During the President's Council Annual Dinner in September, he expressed gratitude for the past decade as well as optimism for the university's next chapter under President-elect Mung Chiang.

Addressing those in attendance, Daniels said, "Thank you for 10 unforgettable years. And trust me on this, the next 10 will be better still. Boiler Up."

"Each time I am around Purdue alumni, I am struck by the same inspiring reaction. Their stories of great accomplishments, great careers, and great lives led almost never began with privileged origins. Overwhelmingly, Boilermakers have come from the small towns, the inner cities, the farms—places where any head start they got more likely stemmed from the values they absorbed than from any great material advantage. It must always be so. My successors in this job must experience the same joy I derive from meeting such alums. That's what tuition freezes, Purdue inner-city high schools, and rigorous, cutting-edge pedagogy are all about."

#### **GAME CHANGERS**

*Female Boilermakers reflect on the impact Title IX—now celebrating its 50th anniversary—had on women's sports at Purdue.* 

In the spring of 1975, not long after Amy Ruley (HHS'78) arrived at Purdue, she participated in a sit-in with other female students to demand that the university's athletic department begin supporting women's athletics.

Three years earlier, Congress had passed the Education Amendments Act, which contained a provision known as Title IX—that included the following 37 words: "No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving federal financial assistance."

Title IX applied to any programs a school offered, but the most glaring inequity was in athletics.

"We felt it was time for Purdue to support women's athletics in the way it supported the men's teams," says Ruley, who recruited friends and family to join the cause. During her first year at Purdue, women were only allowed to play athletics under the direction of the Women's Intercollegiate Sports Organization, which functioned as a club operated by students, often without coaching.

As women became more vocal about the inequities they faced, doors began to open. Purdue hired Carol Mertler as assistant athletics director in 1975 to oversee the development of the women's varsity athletic program and appointed Sally Combs-Dunaway as director of public relations for women's athletics. By 1976, women's intercollegiate sports included field hockey, tennis, golf, basketball, volleyball, swimming, and track. Purdue hired Carol Dewey as its first women's volleyball coach and Ruth Jones as its first women's basketball coach, with other sports being coached by staff members or graduate students. In 1979, volleyball became Purdue's first revenue-producing women's sport. Women's teams were governed by the Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women until the early 1980s when the NCAA took over the governance of women's intercollegiate athletics and its national championship events.

"Once Purdue's athletics department took over administering women's sports, we felt like we'd arrived," says Ruley, who played both basketball and field hockey. "The amount of growth in women's sports at Purdue in my four years was phenomenal. By my junior year, the women's basketball team was playing in Mackey Arena; we had our tuition covered; and we were helping to recruit others."

Ruley earned a bachelor's degree in health, physical education, and recreation and holds the honor of scoring the first basket in Purdue women's intercollegiate basketball history. She went on to become head women's basketball coach at North Dakota State University, a position she held for 36 years.

"Thank God for Title IX," says Ruley. "Who knows how long it would have taken for women to achieve equity in athletics without it?"

It wasn't lost on her that money—or the threat of losing it—talked: The legislation presented a stark economic choice of either offering equal opportunities or losing federal funding, which propelled institutions nationwide to begin supporting women's athletic endeavors.

#### **CELEBRATING TITLE IX'S IMPACT**

Carmella Martin Dunn (P'82) is familiar with breaking barriers. Before she walked on to Purdue's women's basketball team in the fall of 1976 as its first-ever Black player, she'd already made history. During her senior year at East Chicago Roosevelt High School, she got the first tip-off in the inaugural girls' basketball state tournament at Hinkle Fieldhouse in Indianapolis.

"Even with my experience, nobody really looked at me for sports, so to be a walk-on at Purdue was incredible, and playing ball there was wonderful," says Dunn, noting that the university wasn't yet offering women athletic scholarships.

Dunn played through the 1977–78 season, when she gave up basketball to focus on her studies. She continued to be involved in athletics, however, by getting a referee license and refereeing men's recreational games. Today, Dunn uses the interpersonal skills she learned in athletics at Purdue in her work as a pharmacist.

"Same as on the court, I have a team and have to deal with how each person's different attitudes and personalities can affect that," says Dunn.

In 2003, Dunn was one of the first class of women inducted into the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame. She insisted that her plaque reflect both her basketball career and her degree in pharmacy. "I want young women to know that you can be both a scholar and an athlete," she says. "You don't have to choose between the two."

In the fall of 1977, as Dunn was starting her last year on the women's basketball team, Beth Brooke (M'81, HDR'12) was just beginning her career as one of Purdue's first class of female athletes to receive scholarship support.

"The program was in its infancy," Brooke says. "We had to walk from our practice facility and locker rooms in Lambert Fieldhouse to play in Mackey Arena. It was apparent we weren't the guys, but nonetheless, we had a great relationship with the men's team and felt very supported. Our trappings weren't the same, but so what? We were grateful to have a program."

The budding women's basketball program competed against other Big Ten universities as well as smaller universities like Western Kentucky and Central Michigan. "We were building a program, so we weren't

very good," Ruley says. "Ruth Jones, our coach at the time, taught us to quit apologizing and to work at getting better."

Brooke recalls that Jones worked the team hard. "She was wicked smart and a great role model," Brooke says. "From day one, Purdue has run a first-class program."

Brooke, who earned a bachelor's degree in industrial management and computer science, says her athletic experience gave her a leg up in her chosen career fields of accounting and auditing, which in the early 1980s were male-dominated, conservative industries. "Sports taught me everything I needed to know to succeed in business," she says.

Brooke recently retired as a global vice chair of Ernst & Young (EY), at which she was also the global sponsor of diversity and inclusion. She founded EY's Women Athletes Business Network in 2013 with the goal of preparing young women to make an impact outside their sport. "Sports teach us discipline and focus and that losing is just feedback," she says. "We learn to work harder, adjust, and change to get a better outcome."

In 2017, the NCAA recognized Brooke's efforts with its Theodore Roosevelt Award in honor of her work in modeling the ideals and purposes of collegiate athletics.

#### NUANCES OF EQUITY

The scope of Title IX is far-reaching, playing a role in academics, athletics, and the handling of sexual violence at federally funded educational institutions. It was coauthored by former U.S. senator Birch Bayh (A'51, HDR A'65) of Indiana, who played baseball at Purdue and competed as a Golden Gloves boxer. He died in 2019, having lived to see the impact of Title IX on higher education, once calling it the single greatest achievement of his political career.

Though Title IX doesn't mention athletics or sports, the impact the legislation had on girls' and women's sports has been immense in the 50 years since its passing. When Title IX first became law, the differences among men's and women's sports was vast; today, the gap is much narrower. At Purdue, both men and women compete in 10 varsity sports each. There are currently more than 240 women competing in at least one varsity sport at Purdue, with more than 200,000 women competing on NCAA teams nationwide. Purdue has improved opportunities, funding, and facilities to help give female athletes a similar experience to their male counterparts.

"Once Purdue made the decision in 1974 to move the administration of women's sports under the athletics department, the university fully committed to supporting us," Ruley says. "We went from trying out in our own clothing to getting practice gear, practice time, coaching, and more. Once we started receiving scholarships, we thought we had died and gone to heaven."

#### **EVERYONE GAINED**

Title IX didn't just help women, says Nancy Cross (MS HHS'78), who coached women's field hockey as a graduate student and became Purdue's senior associate athletics director for development and sports and the senior woman administrator before retiring in June. Parity across all genders in athletics continues to be Purdue's goal, she says.

"Title IX raised the level of resources for all intercollegiate athletics, regardless of gender," Cross says. "Once we took the gender discussion off the table and made decisions about what was best for all of our student-athletes, there was a shift to embracing the spirit of Title IX." She credits the hiring of Morgan Burke (M'73, MS M'75) as athletic director in 1993 with leading that shift. "He taught us that every decision needs to reflect what's fair to every athlete, regardless of whether they play golf or football."

Cross, now the director of campaigns for the Purdue for Life Foundation, also notes that Purdue supports an equitable allocation of resources in athletics. Financial support that goes to the John Purdue Club helps cover the tuition, room and board, books, and academic-support costs of Purdue's more than 500 student-athletes.

"The women's programs started in the 1970s, so their alumni base is much smaller than the men's, with programs dating back more than 100 years," Cross says. "By not allowing restricted donations, we have leveled the playing field with regard to resource allocation."

#### CONTINUED PUSH FOR EQUITY

Cheryl Cooky—associate professor of American studies and women's, gender, and sexuality studies teaches courses that examine forms of gender-based inequality in sports, giving Purdue students the opportunity to study Title IX's impact and gain an applied understanding of the legislation in the athletics realm.

Cooky's research examines how gender shapes cultural meaning, experiences, and societal structures in the context of sports. She has worked with the Women's Sports Foundation in developing evidencebased policies that address the specific needs of girls in sports. She is the coauthor of the foundation's report on gender equity, titled *Chasing Equity: The Triumphs, Challenges and Opportunities in Sports for Girls and Women*.

"In its 50 years, Title IX has shifted the cultural expectations around what women can do in the athletic sphere, and that impact is certainly worthy of celebration," Cooky says. "But there remain inequities that we still need to address to achieve full equality." She notes, for example, the NCAA's 2021 reported underinvestment in its women's basketball tournament; discrepancies in media coverage of men's and women's sports; and the prevalence of men coaching women's intercollegiate teams.

"It's important for everyone to understand why gender equality matters, why it's important, what's at stake, and why we should care," Cooky says. "The impact of Title IX has been enormous, but our work is not complete. Hopefully in another 50 years, we can say, 'Now we're done.'"

#### LIVE. WORK. PLAY.

Creating a community means more than planning roads and water lines, constructing buildings, and placing an "Open for Business" sign on a window.

It doesn't happen overnight—particularly when its standards for the quality of life in the community match those of the internationally renowned research university next door.

Developing the <u>Discovery Park District at Purdue</u> has required vision and discipline from the start—the vision to create a campus for the next generation of students, families, and companies and the discipline to form a strong foundation by recruiting key corporate partners. Discovery Park is an example of the remarkable things that can be created when academia, industry, and government work together on a common goal.

The \$1 billion mixed-use development of housing, high-end manufacturing, and industry and researchdriven partnerships is already an economic and commercial success. Now, just four years into a 30-year master plan, Purdue and its key local and global partners are taking steps to capitalize on the growing national trend for those who want to live, work, play, and—the latest—retire near a prosperous and progressive university community.

"President Daniels conceived and championed this idea as a way to build the Greater Lafayette economy while making the nearby campus environment exciting and attractive so Purdue can recruit the talent it needs for the future," says Brian Edelman (MS M'84), president of the Purdue Research Foundation (PRF), a private nonprofit foundation that manages the Discovery Park District.

The district's 400-acre expanse includes state-of-the-art research facilities and laboratories for the university's multidisciplinary programs in aerospace and defense, nanotechnology, and other critical fields; manufacturing facilities for high-tech companies that offer high-paying jobs; and multiple housing options.

"It's an economic development vehicle for Purdue University, the Greater Lafayette community, and the state of Indiana," says Rich Michal, senior vice president of capital projects and facilities at PRF.

#### A PLACE TO CALL HOME

The Discovery Park District is a testament to the adage, "If you build it, they will come."

And that's true for families, young professionals, and retirees excited about living near a university community with a vibrant culture.

The area's high quality of living has been recognized on a national scale: West Lafayette was named the eighth-best college town by WalletHub in 2022 for its social, academic, and economic opportunities in addition to low housing costs.

Anchoring the district's residential effort is <u>Provenance</u>, a neighborhood of single-family detached homes, townhomes, condominiums, and apartments. Preserved green spaces and mature trees dot the landscape, and walking trails provide access to nearby parks and golf courses. Future plans include senior housing; a community center; a fitness center; a day-care facility and preschool; restaurants and retail; and community gardens.

Across the street from Provenance, the <u>Source</u> luxury condominium complex will include 57 units designed for alumni and fans who want a place near campus for football weekends and other Purdue events. Residents will enjoy covered parking and close access to Squirrel Park, which will be expanded to include an event venue, apple orchard, and additional gathering and recreational spaces.

Two apartment projects, <u>Aspire</u> and <u>Continuum</u>, are located nearby. The 830-bed Aspire is part of University Residences and features smart-home technology that allows residents to control utilities via an app. Continuum consists of 246 luxury one- and two-bedroom apartments and 15,000 square feet of street-level commercial space.

As demand for housing is met, market demand for community amenities grows. Ascension St. Vincent will construct an eight-bed microhospital in the Discovery Park District, making inpatient and emergency care in West Lafayette possible for the first time. This neighborhood hospital is the first development of a larger medical complex that will focus mainly on outpatient care.

#### WORK FROM PURDUE

Blending the live-work-play concept, the university launched <u>Work From Purdue</u>, an innovative program that offers incentives for remote workers to move to the district and fosters connection and connectivity in the Purdue ecosystem.

Relocation packages include many benefits, including stipends and dining credits at the Atlas Family Marketplace in the Purdue Memorial Union. Purdue, consistently ranked in the 10 most innovative colleges in the nation, is the only university to engineer such a future-focused live-and-work lifestyle for people working remotely.

The <u>Convergence Center for Innovation and Collaboration</u>, billed as the "business front door to Purdue University," is a hub for academic and industry partnering in the district. It has 143,000 square feet of space, including 22,000 square feet of LEED Silver-certified flexible office space. It also has 6,000 square feet of available retail space.

High-tech manufacturing companies Schweitzer Engineering Laboratories, Rolls-Royce, and Saab have invested millions of dollars to locate new facilities in the Discovery Park District, bringing hundreds of

jobs. They also have buoyed Purdue University expertise by authorizing several research agreements with the College of Engineering.

"These three companies locating new facilities in the district have had such a positive impact: Industry wants to be part of and grow in West Lafayette," says Jeremy Slater, vice president of capital projects and facilities at PRF. "They're moving their employees and their families here."

SkyWater Technology and MediaTek will bring high-paying, high-skilled jobs to the district over the next five years. SkyWater will open a state-of-the-art semiconductor manufacturing facility, and MediaTek will build the company's first semiconductor chip design center in the Midwest.

These industry partnerships represent major wins for the national security and technology initiative of <u>Purdue's Next Moves</u> and will advance the university's competitive advantage.

#### A PART TO PLAY

A key milestone to developing the Discovery Park District came when West Lafayette annexed the Purdue campus.

"Purdue officially became part of the city," Slater says. "All of the university's land is now within city limits. This enabled the establishment of new TIF, or tax increment financing, districts."

Taxes collected from the TIF districts are reinvested in the community to enhance infrastructure and attract development.

"The district is being developed as a walkable and dense urban environment where people are going to interact with one another," Slater says. "Provenance follows new urbanism principles: It is built for people, not cars. All homes have porches and thoughtful designs in their master plans to get people connected. That connectivity extends to commercial buildings like the Convergence Center, which has an outdoor plaza where people can congregate and interact. This master plan intentionally creates a sense of place."

Connecting people is an important aspect of creating a sense of community anywhere, including the Discovery Park District, Slater says.

"People of all demographics living, working, and visiting in the community can interact with each other on a regular basis," Michal says. "With anticipated grocery and sundry markets, restaurants, parks, and arts programs at Purdue, residents could walk anywhere they would want to go for recreation or shopping. We are focusing on new components to make the community a pedestrian center with multiuse buildings. We're blessed with close proximity to the university and the culture and entertainment offerings it provides. We want to take advantage of and encourage pedestrian and bike connectivity with those resources." The Discovery Park District will continue to grow and evolve as corporate partners locate jobs and workers to the area and as those workers need options for housing, entertainment, health care, education, and lifestyle amenities—outcomes of a community-building approach marked by vision and careful planning.

"Is there an end point to creating the district?" Slater asks. "I hope not. There's continual improvement and discovery and rediscovery. We are touting this as an innovative place, and there will be changing technologies. The district will evolve, and we'll continue to do that as well."

"Purdue will have a world-class business school that will carry out top-caliber research and educate many students who will be excellent at—and proud of—creating business growth and opportunities," says President-elect Mung Chiang, who succeeds Daniels on January 1.

The new Purdue School of Business is projected to increase current undergraduate business enrollment by 60% and more than double the size of business graduate programs. To meet this demand, the school will be recruiting more faculty members and renovating its current building into a state-of-the-art facility that promotes active learning and collaboration. A fundraising initiative has begun with a goal of raising \$350 million. #### HANDCRAFTED LEGACY

A couple of days before the December 2021 Purdue Global commencement in West Lafayette, Michael Lorenz spotted pieces of the university mace broken and discarded in a trash can.

Lorenz, Purdue Global's vice president of strategy and academic operations and registrar, decided to take a stab at repairing the damaged wood staff that is carried by the mace-bearer, who leads the chancellor and other dignitaries onto the stage at graduation ceremonies.

"In the end, there was just no fixing it," says Lorenz, a self-described amateur woodworker. "A new mace would cost us several thousand dollars. I thought that was money better spent on students, and I would try to make one. I wasn't sure what I was getting into, but I've kind of tinkered with woodworking all my life in some way or another."

Lorenz went to work—measuring, sawing, shaping, and assembling, all with a purpose—and the new mace made its first appearance at the May 2022 commencement in Indianapolis.

The new mace consists of 18 segments, representing Purdue Global's founding in 2018. Lorenz made it entirely from locally sourced woods, symbolizing the university's Indiana heritage. One section is composed of layers of different woods, evoking the diversity of students, faculty, and staff that is a hallmark of the institution and its mission.

Lorenz refurbished three pieces of the previous mace to use in the new one, a reminder of Purdue Global's legacy, which traces its roots to the American Institute of Commerce, a postsecondary school that opened in 1937 to provide training for underserved job seekers in a nation still reeling from the Great Depression.

"I wanted to infuse it with some kind of meaning because maces always seem to be imbued with symbolism," Lorenz says. "Another goal was to make something that felt good to carry, unlike the previous one, which was heavy and unbalanced. A mace is traditionally a medieval weapon, and any good weapon is balanced properly. I also made a choice to leave the wood unfinished, just because I personally like the feel of wood, and not varnish it."

Total cost of the project: "Probably \$45," Lorenz says.

The tradition of the mace originates from medieval times in England when it was carried by bishops of the church into battle as a protective device. Later, the mace was carried by sergeants-at-arms who were bodyguards of kings and others of high rank. Legislative bodies, such as the U.S. House of Representatives and the British Parliament, also adopted the ceremonial mace as part of the pomp and circumstance associated with the beginning of meetings.

Many universities use a mace to symbolize the importance of commencement and as acknowledgment of the academic process.

"There is a lot of Purdue legacy in my family," says Lorenz, noting that his father and his father's parents were all Purdue alumni. "It is nice to have added something to the Purdue Global story beyond working for the university."

Held for just the second time on Friday, October 28, the Purdue Day of Service has already become a shining example of success through both small steps and giant leaps.

"I volunteered because I wanted to give back to Purdue—it's my favorite place in the world," says Campbell, who has four children who also graduated from the university. "I do like to volunteer when I can, so I was happy to wait and make the trip. I think some of that desire was instilled in me during my time at Purdue. I learned how to persevere and how working as a team is really important."

Many volunteers had also attended the inaugural event, including Jennifer Kawlewski (PG'22). An administrative assistant in Purdue's College of Pharmacy, Kawlewski arrived wearing her complimentary T-shirt from the 2021 event but quickly replaced it with the 2022 version.

"I always enjoy doing things for Purdue, which does so much for so many people, and it really is fun," Kawlewski says. "This event is extremely important. With all of the growth and development the university has seen recently, it's important that we get out and make sure we add back some beauty."

Purdue University and the Purdue for Life Foundation created the Purdue Day of Service to encourage alumni and friends of the university to embrace volunteerism. This event aligns with Purdue's 1869 Tree Planting Master Plan, which calls for planting 3,738 trees by fiscal year 2025, and the Sustainability Master Plan. The total number of trees to be planted was determined by doubling 1,869, which is the year Purdue was founded.

The event also reinforced Purdue's standing as an Arbor Day Foundation Tree Campus Higher Education institution, a status the university has held since 2009.

"Our inaugural event was a big success, but the response this year has been incredible," says Courtney Cassady, senior director of outreach and volunteerism for the Purdue for Life Foundation. "People were willing to join our waiting list and be on call just to volunteer. That says a lot about how dedicated the Purdue family is. Our volunteers really worked hard and had fun."

#### **POWERED BY PURPOSE**

Beginning with his time at Purdue, David A. Ricks (IM'90) has had his career defined by education and the opportunities it provides. Now, as chair and CEO of Eli Lilly and Company, Ricks is ensuring that others get the same chance.

Ricks capitalized on his Purdue education and a 1996 MBA from Indiana University to rise through the ranks at Lilly, eventually filling the top position in 2017. Under his guidance, the Indianapolis-based pharmaceutical manufacturing company has strengthened its longtime relationship with Purdue as a research collaborator and talent pipeline.

This relationship was reaffirmed October 27, when <u>Purdue and Lilly announced</u> a 10-year, \$42.5 million pharmaceutical manufacturing scholarship program that will give two exciting opportunities to 75–100 top incoming undergraduate students each year: the ability to study tuition free at Purdue and a guaranteed inside track on full-time employment at Lilly, including a guaranteed internship or co-op experience as a student.

The program, called Lilly Scholars at Purdue University, will award its first scholarships for the fall of 2023.

"Establishing this innovative program benefits everybody," Ricks says. "For students, it's about opportunity—the chance to learn and grow at one of the country's top educational institutions, followed by preferred access to a job with Lilly. But it also helps Purdue recruit those students, who will hopefully one day become key pharmaceutical manufacturing talent for Lilly."

To create a diverse pool of recipients from a broad range of backgrounds, the program will give priority to students in qualifying majors who are underrepresented in Purdue's student body; have overcome obstacles such as socioeconomic or educational disadvantage; or are among the first generation in their family to attend college.

As part of this agreement, Purdue and Lilly will also collaborate to build out new curricula, experiential learning opportunities, and certificate and degree programs in pharmaceutical manufacturing. Advancement in the field is a priority at the university, which has invested \$250 million in life sciences in recent years. This includes \$19 million toward pharmaceutical manufacturing research and development in 2021.

"We believe this program is one of a kind," Ricks says. "Lilly is investing in students and giving them avenues to professional success early in their undergraduate careers, while Purdue is building a comprehensive degree program that helps them recruit top scholars in a cutting-edge manufacturing field."

Lilly is one of the largest employers and oldest companies in Indiana. Every year, the company hires Purdue graduates in engineering, sales, finance, human resources, marketing, procurement, supply chain, and other areas. In fact, Lilly employs nearly 2,500 Purdue graduates—more than from any other university.

"Purdue's programs are rigorous and academically challenging—I know that firsthand," Ricks says. "When you look at who has success with Lilly, there are three commonalities. Of course, there's performance excellence. You have to be smart and deliver results. But as a company, fundamentally, we're here because people need medicine. So acting with integrity and respect for people are two other important hallmarks of success for Lilly. These are traits Purdue graduates have, and that's why they do well with the company."

Ricks joined Lilly in 1996 as a business development associate and climbed through a variety of leadership positions in the U.S., Canada, and China before becoming chair and CEO.

"Lilly is a great place to work because, first and foremost, what we do has a direct, positive impact on the health and well-being of people around the world," Ricks says. "I came to Lilly for the challenges and varied opportunities. But I stayed at Lilly because I believe in what we do: I want to come to work every day and know I've made a difference in people's lives."

While a Purdue student, Ricks was a member of the Phi Kappa Tau social fraternity. He is a former member of the Weldon School of Biomedical Engineering Advisory Board and stays connected to the university through engagements like Lilly Day at Purdue.

"My Purdue education challenged me and prepared me for life," Ricks says. "It opened many doors for me, and I will never forget that. This new collaboration is built around those same fundamentals—great education and great opportunity. Together, we're creating a transformational pharmaceutical manufacturing program with long-term benefits to Purdue, its students, Lilly, and patients."

#### IUPUI realignment creates stronger Purdue presence in Indianapolis

Almost exactly at the halfway point between Purdue University and Indiana University sits the campus of IUPUI—the result of a collaborative vision more than five decades ago that gave both universities a presence in the city of Indianapolis.

On August 12, Purdue and IU <u>announced</u> a bold new vision—a two-year process that will transform the downtown campus into two separate academic organizations.

Designed around each institution's strengths, this realignment will allow both universities to energize their efforts in Indianapolis, increase the number of job-ready graduates in an innovation-led economy, fuel economic growth in the region and the state, and enhance service to the local community.

"This new vision responds to calls we have heard from Indianapolis and across the state for a bigger and more visible Purdue," President Mitch Daniels says. "Our state and its largest city require a world-class, high-technology research presence of the quality Purdue represents, and this will also allow us to provide more opportunities for our students and faculty both in Indianapolis and in West Lafayette."

Purdue will assume responsibility for engineering, computer science, and technology as a fully integrated expansion of Purdue West Lafayette. It also intends to open a branch of the Purdue Applied Research Institute in Indianapolis.

The new structure will allow Purdue to grow its enrollment in Indianapolis, with anticipated growth of more than 1,000 students. Many of these students will be housed in a new residential building near the Purdue academic buildings.

Upon completion of the realignment, projected in fall of 2024, IU will continue to own and operate the Indianapolis campus. IU's presence will be known as IU Indianapolis. The name and branding for the Purdue portion of the campus have not yet been decided.

Further down the timeline, Purdue also hopes to create opportunities for current West Lafayette students to "study away" in Indianapolis while pursuing internships or cooperative work opportunities. Purdue President-elect Mung Chiang says this new vision for Purdue's involvement in Indianapolis "will create economic growth and jobs for Indiana and the entire Midwest."

Even though one partnership is ending, a new one is just around the corner. Both Purdue and IU have agreed to the creation of a joint biosciences engineering institute. Harnessing the power of the universities' academic and research strengths and ongoing collaboration between both schools' health-related disciplines—Purdue's Weldon School of Biomedical Engineering and the Indiana University School of Medicine—the institute will develop life-enhancing therapies and technologies while creating

a sought-after pool of professionals whose research and training will create startups and attract new companies to Indiana.

Although changes are coming—and a lot of questions still need to be answered—Chiang succinctly summed up the announcement: "It's very exciting!"

#### **BEHIND THE GIFTS: A SOUND INVESTMENT**
